Local Report on Activity ARGYLL & BUTE: Apr – Sept 2011

## 1. National Context

In any one year we work with approximately **10,000** companies across Scotland, around **2000** of which through Account Management. Together, these companies employ around **250,000** people. Job creation is a primary focus and through our work **40,000** additional jobs have been created in the last decade. Our activities this year could create a further **4,000 jobs** over the next three years. Opportunities in **offshore wind** could generate a further **28,000** jobs by 2020.

Our priorities are to work with these companies to increase **exports**, improve **innovation** and secure new **investment** – three areas that will have the biggest impact on Scotland's economic performance.

## 2. Our Work with Growth Companies

Account management involves working intensively with the senior management team of a company to agreed objectives across business functions e.g. exporting, investment, human resources, strategic development.

## **13. Scotland's Key Sectors**

SE focuses on working with those sectors most likely to bring the greatest return on public investment to the Scottish economy. The National contribution of the key sectors is substantial:

Page - This project provides support for the Mackintosh Heritage Group's new 5 year plan. The plan includes a wide range of activities to raise the profile of Mackintosh, in order to attract additional visitors and to generate additional visitor spend & GVA impact.

**DESTINATION LOCH LOMOND** - A 2 year programme of inter-related projects to develop, deliver and manage the Loch Lomond destination. It will contribute to the continued development of the National Park and increase overnight stays. Projects will be delivered with public and private sector partners and will aim to maximise industry investment and leadership. Key projects include running the Loch Lomond DMO, Tarbet masterplanning, land/water connectivity, hotel and outdoor activity developments at Loch Lomond Shores.
