# LEVELLING UP PARTNERSHIP PROCESS UPDATE

### **1.0 INTRODUCTION**

- 1.1 The Levelling Up Partnership funding for Argyll and Bute was announced by the previous UK Government in the Autumn Statement. The council received an update in on the Levelling Up process in April 2024 and since this date council officers have worked with UK civil servants to inform the selection of possible projects including identifying possible projects that could be council led. This all changed when the UK Government announced a general election to be held on the 4<sup>th</sup> of July. At that point civil servants stopped engaging with the council and this remains the case at the date of writing this report. The new UK Government has dropped the term Levelling Up with the Department dealing with this agenda renamed Housing, Communities and Local Government.
- 1.2 In the interim period council officers have been reaching out to other Scottish Council's that have been awarded Partnership funding and also looking at manifesto priorities of the new UK Government. This has resulted in a number of proposed changes to projects which are now included in **Table 1** of this report. It should be noted that these projects can only be regarded as suggestions by the council as it is assumed that the UK Government will still choose the projects they want to see delivered following a public engagement process that they carry out as part of the Partnership process. The council will also submit to the UK Government previously agreed projects, as listed in paragraph 3.5. As currently understood, the UK Government will undertake the full business case work supported by the council as they consider appropriate.

### 2.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

- 2.1 Council are asked to:
  - a) Note the update within this report and approve the updated list of projects included in **Table 1** (para. 3.3) of this report to be discussed with new UK Government officials.
  - b) Agree to request that officers seek confirmation from the UK Government that the Levelling Up Partnership monies previously announced are still available to Argyll and Bute.

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# 3.0 DETAIL

- 3.1 Following the change in the UK Government the Levelling Up Partnership process is being revised to reflect UK Government priorities. The term Levelling Up will no longer be used but there has been no indication from the new UK Government that this previously committed funding will be withdrawn. In the interim period council officers have been reaching out to other Scottish Councils who received Partnership funding such as Dundee City Council. It was notable that the capital amounts awarded were under the £5m mark and that elements of revenue funding could also be awarded to support business innovation, or business growth, for example. It should be noted that keeping individual project asks under the £5m capital threshold eases the path through Treasury approval. It was also notable that projects were led by different bodies other than the council and that whilst provisional lists of projects had been agreed with two other councils this was all still subject to a full business case agreement carried out by the UK Government.
- 3.2 Looking at the original long list of projects previously approved by the council for consideration by the UK Government, it is considered prudent to reengage with the UK Government with a revised list of possible asks. This has been informed by discussions with other councils and looking at the new UK Government manifesto/Kings Speech where there is a commitment to grow Scotland's economy and accelerate the delivery of affordable housing for example. These projects are also considered to be deliverable within a relatively short timetable and have clear demonstrable outcomes which is also a key requirement of this process. The availability of match funding is also a key factor.

- 3.4 The above projects will be used as a basis of a new discussion with the UK Government when they decide to reengage with the council. A letter has already been drafted by the Leader of the Council to highlight the need for further investment in Argyll and Bute to grow our economy and address identified infrastructure needs. It is not clear at the time of writing this report that if the funding remains in place, whether the same process of engagement would continue. Discussions will also continue for possible policy interventions which was also a feature of the original fund.
- 3.5 It should be noted that the council will also submit the previously agreed council backed projects with the UK Government. Given advice received these will be considered as stand-alone projects. Additional external funding opportunities will also be pursued. These projects include the following:-
  - Rothesay Pavilion where the council is continuing to pursue funding with both Governments and key partners linked to the delivery of the Rural Growth Deal.
  - The Dunbeg Corridor where detailed planning permissions have recently been submitted with the council looking at a number of strategic housing funds and also TIF funding working with the Scottish Government and housing providers.
  - The Marine Training school and Seaweed Academy is being pursued through the RGD and the timescales of delivery does not coincide with this particular funding opportunity. That said, we are pursuing the fitting out of a new building shortly to go on site at the

European Marine Science park at Dunbeg working with HIE who are the project sponsors.

- **Dunoon Regeneration** is also being pursued looking at various options to prioritise investment. The level of funding required here as previously identified exceeds the capital limits applied to this particular funding opportunity however the council remains open to further dialogue with both Governments.
- **Campbeltown Pier expansion** remains a possible commercial opportunity for the council however it remains at an early stage of development and it is linked to private sector feasibility studies linked to renewables and the whisky industry that are ongoing.
- Islay and Jura we have modified the ask via a competitive funding request to Scottish Government as part of the Islands Infrastructure fund to cover feasibility work in connection with the replacement ferry given delivery timescales associated with this potential project. In terms of the possible roads investment on Islay linked to industry growth this remains a council aspiration linked to possible policy interventions from the UK Government harvesting an element of income generated on the island.

It should also be noted that any project ideas submitted by the council to the UK Government have no guarantee of being selected and are all subject to detailed business case development by the UK Government with council inputs as appropriate. Other projects may also emerge at the discretion of the UK Government and public consultation if this remains a part of the fund going forward."

# 4.0 CONCLUSION

- 4.1 The original UK Levelling Up Partnership process was proceeding as previously reported to council in April until the UK General Election was called and subsequently held on the 4<sup>th</sup> of July. The term Levelling Up has now been dropped by the new UK Government with an increased emphasis on Local Government, boosting economic growth across the UK and accelerating the delivery of new housing.
- 4.2 In the interim period council officers have been speaking to other Scottish Councils in receipt of Levelling Up Partnership funding and examining the new UK Government economic priorities as demonstrated in their manifesto and Kings Speech. This has informed an adapted list of possible projects for consideration by Members to form a basis of discussion with the new UK Government. That said the council will continue to bring to the UK Government's attention previously identified projects listed in paragraph 3.5. It should be noted that there is no guarantee that any of these projects will be supported by the UK Government as they will likely undertake their own public consultation and new projects may emerge from other public agencies and community groups. Council Officers will also continue to pursue external funding sources both for the amended list, and for the previously agreed identified projects.

4.3 As further details emerge of the new process to deliver a £20m investment in Argyll and Bute Members will be kept informed via further reports and/or briefings as appropriate. Members are asked to consider and endorse the new list in **Table 1** as they see appropriate to do so.

## 5.0 IMPLICATIONS

- 5.1 Policy The Levelling Up Partnership funding has the potential to support a number of council priorities included in the Single Outcome Agreement (SOA) and Economic Development Strategy and Action Plan support the sustainable growth of our economy.
