# GRANTS TO THE THIRD SECTOR - 2012/13 MONITORING REPORTS

# 1. SUMMARY

- 1.1 This report highlights how the funding from grants to the Third Sector was spent in 2012/13. Information was taken from the end of year project monitoring reports received from those organisations who were awarded funding through the Third Sector Grants scheme in 2012/13.
- 1.2 The total Third Sector Grants budget made available by the Council for allocation in Mid Argyll, Kintyre and the Islands for 2012/13 was £35,000 and 43 organisations benefitted from an award.

- 2.1. Members are asked to note the contents of the report.
- 2.2 Organisations that do not submit an end of project monitoring report are not eligible for funding from this grant scheme in future years.

## 3. DETAILS

- 3.1. Detailed below is a summary of the information received from the end of project monitoring reports.
- 3.2 A small proportion of applicants over-estimated their projected costs and, as a result, the funding they have received exceeds the 50% limit on funding set in the criteria for the Third Sector Grants. Those applicants are in the process of being contacted to explain the underspend and, where appropriate, return the excess grant funding to the Council

Groups that have submitted constitutions in the last two years will not be required to resubmit their constitutions unless amendments were agreed at their AGMs.
