2.	Office and Business Accommodation
	Off-base Commercial Suppliers Demand Assessment
	Note update from Derek McCrindle as follows;
	Following on from the Stakeholder Workshop at HMNB Clyde on 22/9, attended by a wide range of contractors, the consultants Stantec are progressing with the Outline Business Case aiming for completion early in 2023. The council is considering issues such as delivery from site assembly, planning and how to link into a 'blue light' shared service centre.
	The Faslane Business Centre phase now needs to confirm the economic and financial cases with more detailed input on the specific tenant demand in terms of space required, specification, shared services and numbers of people occupying. This will be further discussed by the Council before submission of the Outline Business Case.
	Ross highlighted that the stakeholder support for a collaboration/innovation hub at Colgrain is strong although it is unclear what that level of demand is. However, the demand for dedicated office space appears low.
	Fergus advised that the Council is focussed on developing a credible business case to submit to the UK Government as part of the Rural Growth Deal. Current timelines are to complete the outline business case by the end of December 2022 and the submission will require to include formal written support of partners which the consultants are pursuing.
	Fergus recommends a phased approach; first phase for a low carbon innovation hub with a second phase for office space. This approach was agreed.
	Ross advised members of the board that if any partners are seeking or want to explore collaboration space now to contact Ross for support.
	MOD Office Rationalisation
	The review of the requirement is ongoing due to impact on working practices from COVID 19. Opportunity for MOD is shape the landscape for negotiation future contracts with defence contractors i.e. demanding a net carbon approach, off site provision etc.

3.	Living Accommodation
	FAM Accommodation Model
	The pilot will end on 31 st March 2023 and subject to evaluation and any recommendations, a new model will roll out in October 2023.
	The board acknowledges that the MOD are yet to resolve how to grow accommodation to meet future demand and are recruiting new resource to develop modelling to inform decisions.
	Single Living Accommodation
	There is a shortage of single living accommodation which will remain a key mechanism to provide housing for personnel to meet future demand hence the need to explore alternative ways to securing suitable housing either through the private sector and/or in partnerships.
	Note that 300 new houses are being built at Helensburgh golf course.
	Ross highlighted that ACHA has a new Chief Executive who is ambitious to be innovative and the MOD may wish to approach ACHA to explore partnership working.
	Action 1;
	 RN to revisit demand study.
	Council will review housing demand for the area once the Scottish Government has provided their report on the emerging Local Development Plan.
	Ukrainian Resettlement Programme;
	Fergus advised that SG funding is available to redevelop property to house refugees. Fergus asked if the MOD could identify up to 6 properties to be considered for the scheme. As a policy, at this time the MOD cannot offer vacant property and will continue to monitor the situation and inform the council of any changes.

	Explored as part of the Rural Growth Deal, concept ideas on low carbon public transport and active travel were costed and are currently unaffordable and therefore not progressing at present with exception to activity that the Council
