SCOTTISH OUTDOOR **ACCESS CODE**

These rights of responsible access include things like:

- walking
- cycling
- sightseeing and picnicking
- dog walking, provided your dog is under proper control
- swimming
- watching wildlife

but do not include:

- access with motor vehicles
- hunting, shooting and fishing





Responsible access can be enjoyed over most of Scotland including:

- parks
- hills and woods
- beaches and the coast
- lochs, rivers and canals

Exceptions include:

- other buildings
- school grounds
- most land where crops
- places which charge for entry

- houses and gardens
- are growing

Campervans, Caravans & Motorhomes

Please take care when travelling in Argyll and Bute. We have spectacular scenery everywhere but many of our roads are narrow and single track. Caution and consideration must be taken for other road users while you take in the dramatic landscapes and natural beauty. When travelling at slower pace and there's a build up of vehicles behind you kindly use passing places to let faster traffic overtake safely.

General Waste / Recycling



When larger items or bags are discarded these bins can fill up within days, leaving trails of litter and nasty smells until they are emptied which could be over 2 weeks later, which isn't nice for visitors, locals, wildlife or the environment.

Advice for **Dog Owners**

- Stop and think, spot

- Stay together, stay close

- In an emergency, call 999

Be a Responsible Dog Owner Do not allow your dog to approach animals, including wildlife or people uninvited. Where possible avoid livestock. Release your dog if threatened by cattle. Always keep your dog in sight and under control if in doubt use a lead. Always bag and bin dog poo, take it home when bins aren't available. To avoid your dog committing a livestock crime please follow the advice below:

- When in the countryside, be wary of your dog approaching other animals.
- Try to stop your dog coming into contact with livestock.
- Remember, in the countryside, it may not always be obvious when animals are around.
