Title of Proposal	
Short-term let licensing regime	

Intended outcome of proposal

To introduce a new licensing regime for short-term let accommodation to meet the new statutory duty on local authorities, with the aim of ensuring that this accommodation sector is safe.

Description of proposal

The licensing scheme was brought in by the Scottish Government under the Civic Government (Scotland) Act 1982 (Licensing of Short-term Lets) Order 2022, with the aim to ensure short-term lets are safe, address issues faced by neighbours, to facilitate local authorities knowing and understanding what is happening in their area, and handling complaints effectively. It also aims to balance the economic and tourism benefits from short-term lets with the needs and concerns of local communities across Argyll and Bute. This is therefore a statutory obligation of the Council.

The licensing scheme has defined procedures which allows for consultation with police and fire authorities, public notification, assessment of the suitability of the property and the applicants, and licences which will detail mandatory and, where appropriate, additional conditions. The scheme will be proportionately enforced in accordance with the Councils enforcement policy.

The Councils environmental health service will deliver the licensing regime, working with partners and stakeholders.

Feedback from the consultation was used to inform the final licensing scheme.
- 6. Licensing scheme will be considered by Planning, Protective Services and Licensing Committee on the 28 September 2022 and by full Council on the 29 September 2022

Data

A variety of source of information and data have been considered including Scottish Government guidance on short term let licensing, and the Councils Non-Domestic Rates (NDR) database.

Scottish Government Short-term Lets in Scotland Licensing Scheme guide Parts 1 and 2.

Gaps in evidence

There is uncertainty over the total number of premises falling within this scheme as the details are unknown. Information from databases identifies 2,650 properties on the Non-Domestic Rates (NDR) although it is estimated that numbers will be higher. A cautious approach has however been taken in estimating the total number of properties which will fall within this scheme, and in setting fees and charges and resourcing for the licensing scheme,
